
OL STUDENTS BRING COMMISSIONER FORUM TO CAMPUS

"The Money Coach" visits Donnelly, gives sound advice to students and community members

The Donnelly campus was buzzing with excitement on Tuesday, April 19, as Lynnette Khalfani-Cox – "The Money Coach" – gave a free presentation to nearly 100 attendees from throughout the Kansas City community.

Cox, a personal finance expert, television and radio personality, and the author of numerous books, has appeared on national TV programs such as "The Oprah Winfrey Show," "Dr. Phil," and "Good Morning America."

She is also a former financial news journalist and Wall Street Journal reporter for CNBC, and has been featured in top newspapers such as USA Today, New York Times, as well as magazines ranging from Essence and Redbook to Black Enterprise and Smart Money.

The event, sponsored by American Century Investments® and the Greater Kansas City Financial Planning Association (FPA), was part of a nationwide Money Smart Month initiative.

Cox took to the podium and quickly captured the attention of the crowd with her unique personal story of climbing out of more than \$100,000 in debt and becoming one of the country's leading financial experts.

"I was a classic over-spender," said Cox. "Trips to the Caribbean, fancy clothes, expensive private schooling for my children.

"It's important to understand that it is not about your income, it is about your spending," she added. "Everyone needs a budget because there is no level of income that cannot be outspent."

Cox also introduced attendees to the four ways money can be used - saving, spending, investing or donating - and gave tips on how to save for college.

"Donnelly was thrilled to host the event and provide this free opportunity to our students, faculty and staff, as well as members of the community," said Donnelly Program Coordinator Paola Zapata, '10.

"To me, the most interesting part of the presentation was when Lynnette asked the audience to take her 'Financially Fit' quiz," she said. "As she went through the ten questions, I could hear audience members chattering with one another. Everyone was commenting on their shockingly low scores. She gave some great tips on easy ways to boost them, but it was eye-opening for folks to see how little they knew about their own financial situations."

Following Cox's presentation, small-group breakout sessions were offered by members of the FPA on topics such as goal setting, budgeting, investment basics and retirement planning.

Financial consultants were onhand to sit down one-on-one with attendees who had questions about their personal finances.

The evening concluded with a door-prize drawing, which included a number of Cox's best-selling books, gift certificates to Sun Fresh, and the grand prize - an iPad2.

Students take lessons outside classroom, travel to Chicago

Students in Donnelly's Chicano Experience class spent much of the spring semester exploring the history of Mexican Americans, discussing cultural identity, and studying poetry, essays, short stories, and novels of immigrant groups.

By spring break, it was time to apply this coursework in the real-world.

Nine students, along with instructor and Vice President of Student Affairs Donette Alonzo, and Program Coordinator Paola Zapata, '10, ventured by train to the Windy City to visit the Latino community of Pilsen.

"Pilsen provided the perfect setting for students to watch their coursework come to life because it is home to both the National Museum of Mexican Art (NMMA) and the strong, community-driven Catholic parish of St. Pius V," said Alonzo.

"Through visiting the museum, participating in service projects at St. Pius, and a number of other activities, students became more tuned in to the Chicano culture and, in turn, their own."

The class took part in a variety of service activities at the parish, from providing teaching assistance at the grade school to sorting clothes at its thrift store to tutoring young children.

"What really affected me was the Dream Wall at the grade school," said student Jackie Ikerd. "I read through the kids' dreams and they were unbelievable. Things like 'Please help reduce discrimination against my friends and family,' or 'Bring my mom and dad back together.' It really put life in perspective."

"I thought I knew a lot about my Latino culture before the trip, but I learned so much more," said student Leo Mejia. "The artwork at the NMMA made me feel proud, and I developed a deeper understanding and appreciation of my culture."

The group also participated in a mural tour and learned the significance of the historic murals that saturate the Pilsen neighborhoods.

"The murals are beautiful," said Mejia. "There was one that confused me, but our tour guide explained it symbolized an immigrant family and their struggles working in different jobs. It included an image of a man working in construction, which made me think about my dad and how he worked in construction when he first came to the country.

"He was the one who encouraged me to go to college, and it amazed me that here I was a college student taking on this new experience while still being reminded of where I come from. It made me feel proud to be in college, fulfilling my dream and my dad's dream."

"Throughout the trip I was constantly reminded of my family's history," said student Jazmin Juarez. "When I came out of Mass, I noticed a woman selling empanadas for \$1. This reminded me of my mother because she used to sell burritos at a stand on the corner of a busy street. I decided to buy an empanada and gave the woman a \$5 bill. Her hands were so cold it was difficult for her to make the change. Her struggle made me think about how much my family struggled."

"The best part, for me, was bonding with my classmates," said student Jose Banuelas. "The night we returned to Kansas City, we were all free to go home but we went out to dinner together instead."

"When students apply classroom learning to real-world experiences, everyone benefits," said President Steve LaNasa.



"This class is just one example of how DC faculty are working to interweave service-learning into all our programs. By incorporating service into their classes, students are challenged to think critically about their role in society and the community comes to know our amazing students on a deeper level."

"People came from throughout Kansas City to experience our festival this year," said faculty member Eric Kolkmeier, who helped plan the event.

"We saw our largest turnout in the event's history, and were overwhelmed by the positive feedback coming from both community members as well as our own Donnelly students. It was truly a great time."

The different cultures were showcased through Donnelly student booths, live music and dance performances, and local food vendors such as Korma Sutra and Bonito Michoacan.

The more than 300 attendees enjoyed a full, seven-hour lineup of live performances, as well as the opportunity to sample free international cuisine and learn about countries such as Russia, Mexico, the Dominican Republic, Iraq, Somalia, Haiti, China, Palestine, Vietnam and many more.

"It was great to see so many alumni and supporters gathered together in one room," said Doherty. "Despite the difference in graduation years, each inductee described their time at Donnelly as one of the most important experiences of their life. Donnelly holds a special place in so many hearts.

"The Hall of Fame is a great way to celebrate not only the accomplishments of these great individuals, but also the overall legacy of Donnelly as a life-changing component in so many lives. In speaking with the current Donnelly students I met at the event, I can see this legacy – and that same Donnelly spirit we all know and love – still lives on today."

The Hall of Fame was established in 2010 as part of the College's 60th Anniversary, and honors inspiring alumni who have helped transform their communities and who demonstrate actions expressing the mission and spirit of Donnelly College.

Ed Dwight, Jr., '51

After Donnelly, Ed joined the U.S. Air Force to pursue his dream of being a pilot. He went on to earn a degree in aeronautical engineering from Arizona State University. In 1962, Ed was selected by the John F. Kennedy Administration as the first African American astronaut candidate. After a successful military career, Ed switched directions, dabbled in a variety of careers, and finally focused on his lifelong passion of sculpture. To date, he has completed more than 115 large-scale sculpture installations. His pieces are collected by museums and art enthusiasts around the world, including the Smithsonian. Ed Dwight Studios, Inc., in Denver is now one of the largest privately-owned production facilities in the western United States.



Carmen Rodriguez, '53

Through Donnelly and its founder, Sister Jerome Keeler, Carmen discovered her life's passion: education. After her Donnelly graduation, she became a member of the Benedictine Sisters of Mount St. Scholastica, earned her bachelor's degree in education from Mount St. Scholastica College, and began teaching. In 1973, she earned her Master of Arts degree in Mexican American Culture from San Jose State University and then moved back to Kansas City briefly where she taught Mexican American Cultural History at Donnelly. She then taught at Los Medanos Community College in Pittsburg, Calif. In 1988, Carmen returned to Donnelly to accept the College's prestigious Delta Award for her work in education.



Susan Carroll, '62

Susan graduated from DC and went on to earn a bachelor's degree in philosophy, psychology and English from St. Mary's College in Leavenworth, Kan. Susan returned to Wyandotte County and worked for the Archdiocese of Kansas City in Kansas for more than 30 years in a variety of roles, including Administrative Consultant to the Archbishop. In 2008, she became the Interim Executive Director for Community Housing of Wyandotte County (CHWC). After two-years, Susan decided to become a full-time volunteer for CHWC. She continues to serve in this role today, as well as on the Board of Directors for various community groups including CHWC, the YMCA, United Way, and Catholic Housing. Susan is a graduate of Leadership 2000 and an active parishioner at the Cathedral of St. Peter where she serves as a Eucharistic minister and lector.



Eugene "Gene" Burdolski, '70

Following his DC graduation, Gene attended the University of St. Mary where he earned his bachelor's degree. He never forgot the tremendous role Donnelly played in his life, and remained connected to the College through his work on a number of committees and volunteer projects. Known for giving back to his beloved Kansas City community, Gene was a board member at the Good Samaritan Project and the AIDS Service Foundation. He also volunteered at organizations like the Hope Care Center and the Friends of Chamber Music. He was an active parishioner at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Kansas City, Mo., where he served in a variety of roles, including Eucharistic minister, lector, usher and choir member. Gene passed away in April 2008. His brother Donald, '68, attended the Hall of Fame ceremony on Gene's behalf.

Sister Grace Malaney, OSB, retires



Donnelly's hallways have lost a little of their luster after the retirement of beloved math instructor Sister Grace Malaney, OSB.



Sister Grace has been a part of the Donnelly community for 30 years and her humor, dedication and fervor for teaching will be missed by all.

"She has been a strong part of our community for so long, and has become a very close friend," said fellow instructor Karen Judy, biology instructor. "She had a way of making people laugh while still commanding their utmost respect. She knew when to be serious, but she was usually silly and could brighten any day."

Sister Grace first came to the College in 1981 as a math tutor.

"I had just arrived back in the United States after living in Mineiros, Brazil, at a Benedictine monastery," said Sister Grace. "I was there with a group of my fellow sisters to offer Bible circles and religious education to the people in the town.

"It was a diverse environment in Brazil and I learned so much – including how to speak Portuguese!"

Donnelly had a diverse population of students, as it still does today, and that was what first interested her.

Sister Grace began teaching college algebra, trigonometry and eventually added calculus to her course schedule.

"I love Donnelly for so many reasons, but first and foremost I love the students," she said.

"The students are truly great human beings and are so accepting of other cultures and backgrounds. I've witnessed many students thrive at Donnelly. People really transform here, and I'm proud to say I've been a part of that."

Sister Grace recently began teaching in the College's Preparatory Education program, working to prepare students for college-level math courses.

"This was a learning opportunity for both me and the students," said Sister Grace. "I bonded with many of them because they worked so hard and put in an enormous amount of effort in order to better themselves. I saw a lot of 'light-bulb moments,' which was gratifying for me."

"I went into her class thinking I wasn't any good at math," said Latonya Meredith, a student in Sister Grace's final basic algebra class. "I was just hoping to pass!

"She took extra time with me and explained things until I understood. My confidence grew and I soon realized that math comes naturally to me. I just needed someone to give me a little extra time and attention. Sister Grace gave that to me."

"Latonya learned math skills, but like so many students I've taught throughout the years, she also learned she could excel," said Sister Grace. "She discovered a passion for math right before my eyes."

Sister Grace has finished teaching her final Donnelly class, and is in the process of moving to the Benedictine Sisters' monastery – Mount St. Scholastica – in Atchison, Kan.

"It's not really retirement," she said. "It's more like 'recycle-ment.' We sisters don't really retire."

Sister Grace now hopes to devote her time to caring for the elderly at the Dooley Center, a nursing home that is part of Mount St. Scholastica.

"Sister Mary Grace is a well-loved sister," said Sister Anne Shepard, OSB, Prioress at Mount St. Scholastica and member of the Donnelly Board of Trustees. "She approaches life with humor, candor, simplicity, integrity, gentleness, intelligence and love for the poor.

"Throughout her 30 years at Donnelly she cared about each individual student. She enjoyed watching them excel and came up with creative ways to approach the different topics. She found ways to relate to each student and let them know they were important. I know she will miss them very much."
