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



I OCTOBER 13 | To close out Hispanic Heritage Month, **Gene Chávez of Humanities Kansas** presented 'Flour Power', an informative discussion on the rich history of Mexican immigration to Kansas.

J OCTOBER 23 | Donnelly's oncampus **futsal field grand opening** was celebrated with a field blessing from Monsignor Swetland and a kick-off match between students and staff.

K NOVEMBER 4 | Over 20 employers visited Donnelly's campus for the Job and Internship Fair. Students had the opportunity to network with local companies, ask career questions and apply for internships and parttime and full-time positions.

L NOVEMBER 10 | Immaculée Ilibagiza, Rwandan survivor and New York Times best-selling author of *Left to Tell: Discovering God Amidst the Rwandan Holocaust*, shared her story of resilience at Donnelly's Event Center. Her book was chosen as Donnelly's 2021–2022 Common Read selection.

Meet the longest-serving instructor at Donnelly College: Joe Multhauf

Joe Multhauf always knew he wanted to be a teacher. From a young age, he found a passion for science, technology, engineering and math (STEM), which eventually led him to pursue several degrees in related fields. Multhauf graduated from Shawnee Mission Northwest High School in the late 1970s and earned a Bachelor of Science in biology with a minor in humanities from Cardinal Newman College in St. Louis. Multhauf's love of learning didn't stop there; he then earned a Master of Arts in curriculum and instruction

from the University of Missouri – Kansas City while taking additional elective biology courses.

Multhauf joined the Donnelly faculty in 1992, making this his 29th year of teaching at Donnelly, with a total of 30 years teaching throughout his career. During his early years at Donnelly, he also taught as an adjunct instructor at Johnson County Community College. Multhauf recently took some time to reflect on what led him to Donnelly as well as why he has dedicated so many years to teaching here.

Where did your passion for STEM begin?

A passion for STEM learning runs in my family! My father was a surgeon, and I used to tag along with him when he made house calls and went on rounds at various area hospitals. Many of his patients lived in the neighborhoods around Donnelly and watching him help those in need instilled in me the same desire to help others. I also remember mixing chemicals in the bathroom sink as a child because I wanted to see what would happen. Of course, my mom was none too happy about those experiments. As a youth, I was highly involved with the Boy Scouts and that developed my love for the outdoors. I've always enjoyed studying science as well as the wonder and awe of God's creation.

How did you find Donnelly?

I started teaching as a graduate assistant at UMKC in the late 1980s. In the early 90s, I





applied for an adjunct teaching job at JCCC and taught biology, anatomy and physiology, head and neck anatomy, microbiology, pathophysiology and nutrition for a total of 12 years. During that time, I met Gonca Yurteri, a chemistry teacher at JCCC who was also teaching at Donnelly College. She invited me to apply at Donnelly to teach an evening biology course. I was interviewed and hired by Donnelly biology professor Karen Judy in 1992.

You are the longest-serving instructor at Donnelly – what has kept you here?

I love the diversity at Donnelly College and the small class sizes. I love working with students and I believe in the mission of the College. My Catholic faith is the most essential aspect of my life, and I feel the responsibility to serve the community and live out Christ's gospel message.

What are some of your favorite memories from your time here?

I have so many important memories, but one of the best was moving from the old academic building to the new building. It was a big job, but the faculty and staff all pulled together to make it happen. Everybody is excited to be in our new facility because it is an excellent environment for students to learn and grow. students on various scientific projects during our summer STEM academies and planting and caring for our community garden. One funny story has to do with the old hospital building. From what I understand, there was an autopsy ward on the lower level where they would take the bodies of deceased patients. Some of the former maintenance crew insisted they saw spirits, but I never saw any Donnelly ghosts. But I do remember looking over my shoulder many nights just to make sure there were no ghosts following me home.

What is a good piece of advice for students?

I would encourage students to work hard, study hard and follow their dreams. I would also encourage students to take care of their environment, to serve their community and to use the talents God has given them to the best of their ability.

Donnelly College has always prided itself on serving underrepresented communities and being intentional about removing barriers and challenges for students. Historically, Donnelly has served first-generation, immigrant and non-traditional students – individuals who may not have a role model to help them navigate the college enrollment process.

In the last several years, the Donnelly community has become more intentional in asking the question, "How can we be more accommodating and more deliberate about putting students first?"

Although the "student-first mindset" has always been a part of Donnelly's culture, the idea became more prominent as initial planning for the campus renovation began. The new academic building is a physical reminder that students are the center and focal point of the school's mission. The building itself was created to be a resource for students. Every classroom, study space, technology resource, and department placement within the building was strategically considered.

Assistant Vice President of Student Affairs, Dr. Mary Pflanz, was a part of the committee to brainstorm ideas for the Tutoring Center and other student resources. "Rather than expecting students to be college-ready, the college needs to be student-ready," she said. "Having a student-ready mindset will help us serve a more diverse group of students. We try not to assume anything and get student responses through surveys and opendoor policies. We focus on students' assets rather than limitations."

One of the highlights in the new facility is located in the heart of the building – the two-story Dean-Lozoya Family Academic Resource Center (ARC). The ARC features natural lighting, open design and central access. Here, students are provided a space to not only seek assistance with classes or assignments, but also to grow practical skills through mock interviews and test prep.

"When we designed this building, we considered the flow of student service delivery, common spaces outside the classrooms and optimal design to enhance student success," said Chief Operating Officer Lisa Stoothoff.

Donnelly's previous building was more a "campus of hallways" with limited options for students to gather outside of classrooms. Higher education research shows that collaborative learning opportunities outside the classroom are just as important to student success.

After the new academic building opened to students in August 2020, students immediately noticed how much easier it was to navigate the college. The first floor of the building houses everything students need, from admissions counselors and the Testing Center to the Registrar and Financial Aid Office, as well as attractive student common spaces. The center of the first floor is home to the library with quiet study spaces and computers. Across the hall lives the Campus Cupboard a food-assistance initiative that was started in 2019 by Professional Tutor, Sister Sharon Hamsa, O.S.B.

When Sr. Sharon realized that students were coming to class hungry, she researched what other schools did to help students with food assistance. At the time, she was working in Donnelly's Tutoring Center. When no one else was available to run the Cupboard, she stepped up and took it over as a volunteer. Students can stop by at specific times throughout the week to shop for themselves or family members in a safe, accepting environment. To keep the shelves stocked, Donnelly partners with other nonprofits like Giving the Basics and Catholic Charities. Since opening in 2019, the Campus Cupboard has also been supported by student interns as well as other faculty, staff and community volunteers.

When the pandemic forced all in-person classes to move to virtual learning in spring 2020, Donnelly's leadership supported keeping the Campus Cupboard open for students by shifting in-person shopping to drive-thru curbside pickup.

"Students, maybe more than ever, really needed help during the pandemic," said Associate Director of Academic Support Yvonne Telep, who assisted with the Campus Cupboard services during the pandemic. "That is an example of the student-first mindset. We wanted to make sure this service was available to students, so we figured out a way to make it happen. I think the students so appreciated it."

From an academic standpoint, the student-first mindset has directed class scheduling, curriculum and policies.

"The Academic and Student Affairs Leadership Team always goes back to this question – Can we be doing something better to put students first? Everything we do is to make learning better: strengthening the curriculum, hiring the best people, making information accessible," said Stoothoff.

One way of doing this is having Spanish-speaking faculty and staff. As a federally designated Hispanic-Serving Institution, having bilingual staff to help explain finances or the enrollment process is vital. To better serve new students, Donnelly's firstyear experience classes introduce the Donnelly culture and help prepare incoming students for college life. Another way instructors utilize this mindset is making assignments due in the early morning instead of late at night for the students who need time after a full day of work to get their assignments done.

A recent change implemented in response to student input was the shift to block scheduling for classes. The purpose of creating 75-minute classes with 45 minutes in between was to give students time to eat, study, check on their kids, make a needed phone call, visit the Tutoring Center, speak with instructors or work with peers. With no classes scheduled on Fridays, students have a full day to work, spend time with their families or complete internship hours. During the pandemic, when inperson classes shifted to virtual, surveys showed that students missed being on campus. Now that in-person learning has resumed, the campus remains open on Fridays for students to continue seeking resources or community.

Also included is the importance of service learning – giving back to the community and learning through an experienced-based curriculum.

"This institution is about the students," said Dr. Pflanz. "If there are no students, there is no college. Our aim is to give them the best experience they can have and allow them to be the best version of themselves."

What does "student-first mindset" mean to you?

"Donnelly College has been such a blessing in my life! I have experienced firsthand how much Donnelly cares for its students. They always make a way for their students [to succeed] by being flexible and taking students' personal life into account."

Dr. Dora Fonseca '90





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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

2020-2021 Academic Year



began this school year with such a grateful heart. Even with all the difficulties associated with COVID-19, God has been so good to Donnelly College. I can say without a doubt God has blessed and continues to bless our students and mission.

Donnelly College continues to benefit from our enhanced facilities. Our academic building is now a year old, and I am

constantly amazed by its bright and welcoming spaces. Donnelly students have benefitted from state-of-the-art labs and technology and the additional space in classrooms has been critical in enabling us to reduce class sizes for social distancing. We simply could not have continued in-person classes during the pandemic if we were still in the old building.

Additionally, our campus master plan is nearly complete. Despite supply chain problems, in September, our quad and futsal field were installed. In late October, the futsal field was blessed and an inaugural game was played between staff, alumni and students. The Seelos Chapel was in use as soon as we moved into the building in August 2020, but final touches continued to be added, including stained glass windows retrofitted from Donnelly's Meeting Room (formerly the Providence Hospital Chapel). Three additional custom stained glass windows were added in September 2021 featuring Blessed Francis Xavier Seelos, Our Lady of Guadalupe and Saints Scholastica and Benedict. Some other highlights from the 2020-21 academic year:

- Growing enrollment is key to our long-term sustainability plan. Whereas colleges across Kansas experienced enrollment declines averaging eight percent, Donnelly's Fall 2020 enrollment was up 11 percent over Fall 2019, including a substantial increase in freshman class size. We sustained this increase in Fall 2021.
- We received approval from the Kansas State Board of Nursing for an additional cohort of 25 Practical Nursing students who started in August 2021.
- Retaining students is also critical to sustainability. Despite disruptions caused by the pandemic, our fall-to-fall retention was up 10 percent over the previous academic year.
- For the fifth straight year, Donnelly has been named the "Most Diverse College in the Midwest" by U.S. News & World Report. Our bachelor's degree programs have been recognized as the most affordable in Kansas by Affordable Schools.
- Last academic year, Donnelly faculty and staff worked very hard to prepare our application requesting approval to permanently expand distance learning. In June 2021, we received approval from the Higher Learning Commission to offer online programs and expand hybrid courses. This expansion will allow for additional flexibility for current students and opportunities to reach out to new student populations, such as students outside our commuting radius seeking a faith-based education.

- In October, we hosted our annual SHINE event virtually from the new building's lobby and showcased a virtual tour of the academic facility. A public campus dedication is planned for April 22, 2022 so our donors and benefactors may visit the new building in person.
- We have raised over \$34 million for our campus transformation campaign, and we expect to conclude our fundraising by Summer 2022.
- After voting in an official mascot in 2019, last year we took another major step in bringing our mascot to life. We named the mascot "Lux" after Donnelly's motto *Lux Vera*. Lux the dragon made his live debut on the first day of classes in Fall 2020.

God has been so good to us! During the academic year, we offer mass each weekday at 12:20 p.m. In gratitude for his goodness, we pray for our students, faculty and staff. We also pray for our benefactors who have graciously shared a portion of their resources to support our mission "to serve those who otherwise might not be served." As we live out our values by **seeking truth**, **building community** and **pursuing excellence**, we cannot thank you enough for your support, prayers and sacrifice for our mission. You have helped us shine the light of Christ, *lux vera*, in a time of darkness.










